I'm proud to be part of the work these students are doing on behalf of BTC!



February Question: I found a desk/whiteboard/chair I want to buy. Can I just buy it?

Answer: Oh, thank you for asking before just buying! You are now the favorite.

BTC has standards for furnishings here on campus, from chairs to whiteboards to bigger pieces of office furniture. These standards have been identified as part of a team effort between Purchasing and Facilities. There really are reasons behind having to purchase vetted office items like cork boards, whiteboards, and furniture.

Most of the reasons for these standards are quality-related. Some of the reasons have to do with building certifications, such as what can go into Campus Center, a LEED building. And some reasons have to do with WA State regulations on the environmental impact of what the item is made of.

What is LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design)? It is a global rating system for building green structures and is the most widely used green building system rating in the world. If a building, like Campus Center, is certified, we have to be mindful of what goes into the building, from flooring to furniture to lighting.

This month's employee spotlight is shining on Nyssa Howell.


Q: What's your position and title here at BTC? Now and in the future? A: Counselor
